#### **News from the Clubhouse**

#### New Year's Special Discount for Stays at the Clubhouse.

The cost of staying one night is currently \$37.50. Out of that, we pay the PayPal fee of \$1.80 and make breakfast supplies available. We want to offer members an inexpensive place to stay, and one of the ways to do that is volume.

During the month of January, you can purchase one set of 10 vouchers for \$300 (\$300 check/\$315 PayPal). They can be used in any combination during the 2023 calendar year. Stay 10 separate nights or five weekends. You can use them for other members to stay as well–bring a friend for five nights.

Why are we lowering the price when we always talk about needing money? We want to cultivate a large group of people who stay at the house frequently, and have a greater sense of ownership. That will translate into people who want to help keep the house in tiptop shape. And of course, we get the money upfront (there won't be any refunds - if you don't use the vouchers you will lose them. Of course, you can always sell them to another member...).


How does it work? I will keep track of your 10 vouchers. When you book, you simply put the number of vouchers you will be using in the voucher field, for example, 2. I will then deduct them from your bank of vouchers.

Help the club and get a great deal in the process. Don't delay, purchase your vouchers today!

#### Composting at the SWC Clubhouse

Last year, Vermont passed a law that requires all businesses and households to compost. There is a big bowl on the counter under the kitchen window to place your compostable food scraps. Before you leave, empty the bowl into the bin by the back door. There is a layer of leaves in the bin now, but you have to add shredded newspaper or paper bags

## Turn up the Heat

We installed Nest thermostats at the Clubhouse to keep heating costs under control. The thermostats are located in the kitchen and the office area. During the weekends, the heat is set at 68 degrees from 6 AM to 10 AM. It will go back up to 68 degrees from 5:30 PM to 10:00 PM.

If you are there during the week or midday on weekends, simply turn the dial on the Nest to set the temperature manually. Make sure to turn it down at night and when you leave.

Another word on heating the house. The room thermostats are extremely expensive to run. We usually turn it on when we arrive for 15 minutes or so to get the room warm. PLEASE do not leave it running when you are not in the room, and remember to turn it off at the end of

your stay. We continue to have a problem with electric heaters running in the rooms for a week when no one is in the house.

For those of you that like it cold at night, Room 26 is a good option.

Note: There are cameras installed in the fireplace room and the dining room. I check them intermittently to make sure the fire is attended and the stoves are off when not in use. I also check them if the door code is used and there isn't supposed to be anyone in the house (it's only happened once, and the members just got their days mixed up.)

#### **Reservation Help Wanted!**

After five years working on upgrades to the house and reservation system, it is time for me to begin looking for a replacement. This year, that would include receiving notifications of reservations, making sure the person is a member and that they paid for the reservation. It is all done from the comfort of your home (all you need is an email account and access to our website). Obviously we are headed into our busy season, with nearly 200 reservations expected over the next three months. We are working on making the process even more streamlined to limit the amount of work, but you can expect to spend about two hours a week on this aspect. I will continue to be involved with special reservations (questions about vouchers and the weekly rentals), as well as purchasing supplies.

#### A Clean House is a Welcome House

We continue to hear how great the house looks and how it is cleaner than ever. After a year-long search, we interviewed a cleaner a few days ago, and will hopefully have biweekly cleanings of the Clubhouse during the ski season. It is pretty expensive (\$500 a month), but it is important that the house is as clean as possible.

Members will still have to clean up after themselves during and after their stay. We appreciate everyone's effort to make the Clubhouse a welcoming place.

#### Nordic Weekend at the SWC House in Stowe

# Remembering Freddie Anderson

If a skiing enthusiast family tree were crafted for all the wintersport lovers of the Capital Region, there is little doubt its roots would be intertwined with Freddie Anderson's name.

Freddie, a pillar of SWC's legacy, passed away on December 19, 2022 at the age of 101, just months shy of her 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday. Countless children (and some adults) connected to SWC learned to ski under Freddie's tutelage – she first started teaching the fundamentals of skiing as a student at Smith College before returning home to Schenectady and volunteering her time as an instructor with SWC. She started taking regular train jaunts to North Creek, which was her early introduction to SWC (and how she met her husband, Henry) and continued on with the ski train throughout its run.

In 1950, Freddie founded the Schenectady Ski School, which moved to Maple Ski Ridge 16 years later. Freddie continued to teach at Maple well into the 21<sup>st</sup> century, having taught up to three generations of skiers how to glide fluidly downward.

Anyone who took a lesson with Freddie is familiar with her particular brand of no-nonsense instruction for those perfect parallel-ski s-turns that was matched with her boundless energy and permeating warmth. On even the coldest days, Freddie made skiing a joy, and children took to her guidance as though learning from a beloved grandmother. Like with most grandmothers, there was only so much one could get away with, but there was a lot of love and generous accolades shared.

That personality extended beyond the slopes and many in the Schenectady region also knew her for her civic engagement with groups like the Junior League, where she was a member, officer, and later member emeritus. Freddie's knowledge of the local community was a treasure trove of connection. She brought people together, simply put.

And so her loss is especially piercing. Freddie's reach was impressively expansive; her charm radiated far beyond the Schenectady area. She was featured in national media multiple times, notably on CNN for still skiing and teaching in her 90s (she finally retired from skiing at age 95) and being named one of the 10 best instructors in the U.S. by *Ski Magazine* in 2006.

A mid-prandial stroll 'round the dining room at the clubhouse shows how intrinsic Freddie's influence was in the development of SWC. Her memory will be a blessing in the clubhouse's gathering rooms and halls, keeping the drafty White Lady ever warm in even the coldest winter days.
